The th Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness



The American Revolution did not start on July 4th, 1776. In fact, the Declaration of Independence wasn't even signed on July 4th, 1776. On July 2nd, the Declaration of Independence was submitted by Thomas Jefferson. After two days of debate and rewrites, it was adopted by congress on July 4th. However, it wasn't until August 2nd when the Declaration of Independence was signed by most of the 56 "founding fathers" at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Now that you know when the Decleration of Independence was really signed, do you know when the American Revolution really started? From 1756 to 1763, France and England battled for land rights in the New World. With France advancing from Canada and Britain from the east, their forces met in the Ohio Valley. In 1763, the Treaty of Paris ended the 7 Year War (French and Indian War). France surrendered all possessions east of the Mississippi River which gave Britain security and the need to keep an army within their 13 colonies.

In March of 1765, a tax was applied to colonists through the Stamp Act. The Britain Parliament placed a tax on all legal documents, newspapers and even playing cards. The tax was meant to pay for the army which was left in the American colonies after the French and Indian War. However, colonial support was non-existent within Parliament, colonists were not happy about taxation without representation. Protests, boycotts and the formation of groups such as "The Sons of Liberty" caused Parliament to repeal the Stamp Act just seven months later do to mounting resistance and merchant concerns. This was a win for the colonists, who used this as a springboard for further acts of insurrection against unfair British doctrine.

The Townshend Duties were enacted in 1767. This was a tax, much like the Stamp Act, that Britain collected on goods. This tax on glass, lead, paint and paper, was meant to pay the expenses of governing the American colonies. The colonies resisted. However, colonial protest and boycotts did not inspire Britain to

repeal this tax, instead, it encouraged them to occupy Boston with British troops to fight back on local radicals. On March 5th of 1770, as British Troops were guarding the customs house of taxable goods, colonists began taunting and throwing things at the troops. They started with snowballs, and it escalated from there. Many were wounded and five dead as British troops fired into the crowd. In America, this is known as the Boston Massacre. In England, it is known as the incident on King Street. The news of this massacre spread throughout the colonies.

For the next few years, American colonists who stood against Britain's rule would form organizations in protest and defiance of England. One of these groups was the Sons of Liberty, with key members, including Samual Adams, John Hancock, and Paul Revere. Their contributions included many insurrectionist acts against British tyranny. One specifically was the Boston Tea Party in 1773. In April of 1775, British troops advanced to Lexington and Concord from Boston to arrest leaders of the Sons of Liberty and seize arms from colonists. Two important events happened during this time. The first is Paul Revere's famous midnight ride. The Son's of Liberty had a spy in Boston who warned Revere of British advancement with lamps outside of the Old North Church. One if by land, two if by sea. Paul Revere and other patriots rode towards Lexington and Concord, warning colonists along the way. The second event occurred once the British troops arrived in Lexington, Massachusetts. Their mission was to seize gun powder and arrest Samual Adams and John Hancock. It is not clear who fired the first shot, but that "Shot Heard Round the World" is said to be the official beginning of the Revolutionary War. It was the first time colonial forces directly battled British soldiers in open battle. The colonists showed great tenacity and drove the British troops back to Boston. All the way back. Along the way back to Boston, the British lost even more troops due to the thousands of Minute Men who heard about the skirmishes in Lexington and Concord from Paul Revere and other patriots. Once the minute men reached Boston, they surrounded the city and took it back.

In 1783, after over one hundred thousand were dead, the Treaty of Paris ratifies the independence of the thirteen North American states, marking the official end to the Revolutionary War. Canada remained a British Province becoming America's neighbor. So, American independence began in 1776, but our independence wasn't officially recognized by Britain until 1783. Within a matter of twenty years, colonists recognized British tyranny, organized against it, and fought their way to freedom for all of us. Ironic how one Treaty of Paris got us into war, and the second marked the end.

Our Fourth of July celebration could not be possible without the brave men and women of early colonial America who sacrificed their own life, liberty and pursuit of happiness to ensure ours. I wonder what they would say about America in 2025. I hope everyone has a happy 4th of July weekend. I hope this information made it a little easier to appreciate why we celebrate. 
7pm- Karaoke with Bill Miller! Come show off your pipes or just come for the entertainment.
